

As the Year 2020 winds down, I am looking forward to 2021 for many reasons. At the top of my list is the END of Covid-19 as the vaccines become available world-wide for all who want to take them. Next is the resumption of our Eastern Star meetings and events that we share with each other, especially the 50th Triennial Assembly to be held in Salt Lake City, Utah, in late October and early November 2021. of us will most likely reconsider that which we feel is important in our lives. It is not fame or wealth, but family and health. Each of us who survived 2020 will always remember the sadness and sense of loss we felt when a "virus" robbed us of "normal" and many friends and loved ones.

The staff at the International Headquarters have completed the preparation and mailing (emailing) of the GGC 2020 Annual Reports for the Subordinate Chapters under the direction of General Grand Chapter. We had to think outside of the box and develop new methods of communicating the reports necessary, as well as the delivery of items such as Dues Receipt Cards and Charters. I will be submitting legislation to remove some of the pre-twentieth century restrictions for the Annual Reports. Email is a wonderful tool and scanned reports sent via email need to be allowed as official reports.

Along with the pandemic, the weather has been destructive in many areas. Recently, at the request of the MWGM, by approval of the RWGTrustees, a donation from the GGC Permanent Disaster Relief Fund was sent to the Grand Chapter of Louisiana. This donation was for relief assistance after multiple hurricanes destroyed portions of the State and impacted the residences of many of our Eastern Star members.

In late April 2020, we received our order of large print spiral Rituals in Navy, as well as White covers. If you have not purchased a 2018 Printing (2009 copyright) of the GGC OES Ritual, please contact your Grand Secretary to place an order. We now have an ample supply of Rituals in small print book bound, and large

GUIDELINES FOR AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION, RITUAL, BYLAWS, RULES and REGULATIONS, AND BOOK OF INSTRUCTION

SUBMISSION DATE GUIDELINES FOR THE FIFTIETH (50th) ASSEMBLY IN SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH

Guidelines for the dates for submission and distribution of the <u>Resolutions</u> for the 50^h Assembly to be held in Salt Lake City, Utah on November 1, 2021 through November 4, 2021 are established in the General Grand Chapter Preamble, Constitution, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and Book of Instruction, commonly referred to as the Red Book. Specific citations from the <u>2018 Edition</u> are as follows:

Article XV. in the Constitution;

Chapters X. and XI. in the Bylaws for the Ritual;

Chapter XII. in the Bylaws for the Parliamentary Authority;

Chapter XIII. in the Bylaws for the Bylaws;

Section 92 in the Rules and Regulations for the Rules and Regulations;

And the Amendments; Amendments, Alterations and Additions in the Book of Instruction for the Book of Instruction.

Please review these items for complete information regarding the Guidelines and the processes for the submission of Resolutions for consideration.

Immediately upon receipt, the **Proposed Resolution** shall be sent to the **Jurisprudence Committee** for review and acceptance for proper form, or returned to the person submitting it, for suggested revisions to change it into proper form.

Sample Resolution for the 50th Assembly in 2021 Salt Lake City, Utah

Format below may be used or Resolutions may be drawn up according to Robert's Rules so long as they are perfectly clear and contain all the pertinent information.

Begin with a Statement of the Purpose of the Resolution:

Be changed to read:

(d) It shall be the exclusive judge of the qualifications of its own members, shall prescribe and determine the qualifications for membership in the Order within a Subordinate Chapter directly under the jurisdiction of General Grand Chapter, or a Subordinate Chapter directly under a Grand Chapter under General Grand Chapter, and shall prescribe and determine the Official Dues Receipts for all members in the Order within a Subordinate Chapter directly under the jurisdiction of General Grand Chapter, or a Subordinate Chapter directly under a Grand Chapter under General Grand Chapter. (AM 1982) (AM 2009)

CHAPTER II, OFFICERS, COMMITTEES, DEPUTIES AND AMBASSADORS (AM 2003)

5. RIGHT WORTHY GRAND SECRETARY: (m), page 38 (AM 2009)

(m) Act as the agent of the General Grand Chapter in the purchase and sale of officers' jewels, Rituals, blanks, books, seals, signets, receipts, forms, and other articles and supplies to be furnished to Grand Chapters, their Subordinate Chapters and Chapters under the jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter. Act as the agent to determine the color, format, design and contents of the Official Dues Receipts for all members in the Order with the approval of the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Right Worthy Grand Trustees. (AM 2009)

Be changed to read:

(m) Act as the agent of the General Grand Chapter in the purchase and sale of officers' jewels, Rituals, blanks, books, seals, signets, receipts, forms, and other articles and supplies to be furnished to Grand Chapters, their Subordinate Chapters and Chapters under the jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter. Act as the agent to determine the color, format, design and contents of the Official Dues Receipts for all members in the Order within a Subordinate Chapter directly under the jurisdiction of General Grand Chapter, or a Subordinate Chapter directly under a Grand Chapter under General Grand Chapter, with the approval of the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Right Worthy Grand Trustees. (AM 2009)

Dear Sisters and Brothers:



Mrs. Rennie Ofton was born in Austin, Texas on August 31, 1929. She was married to the love of her life, Mr. Paul Ofton, and this union was blessed with one daughter, Laura Lynn Frambs. Paul operated a trophy shop for many years. During her working years, Rennie served as Executive Secretary to the commanding general, San Antonio Air Logistics Center at Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio, a very responsible position.

A member for most of her adult life, Rennie was initiated into the Order of The Eastern Star on April 26, 1955. Rennie and Paul were life-long active and supportive members of Harlandale Chapter #750 in San Antonio, with Rennie serving in several stations. During these years, Rennie also worked extensively with Rainbow and, later in life, was awarded the Grand Cross of Color. She also received her majority. She served as Worthy Matron for the first time in 1961-62, Deputy Grand Matron in 1965-66, District Deputy Grand Matron in 1967-68, and was Grand Examiner—at Large in 1968-69. Rennie was elected Associate Grand Conductress of Texas in 1975, and served the Grand Chapter of Texas as Worthy Grand Matron in 1978-1979 with Worthy Grand Patron Mr. T.L. "Duke" Weaver of Templar Chapter. Her Grand Chapter was the Ninety-seventh "The Nature of God's Love" Session in San Antonio. The Grand East had a single full-blossomed tree standing against a background of green and white, representing the full cycle of the Grand Chapter year from the "Tree of Life" Installation. Her theme was "Caring and Sharing" and her Special Thought for the year was "Life is for Living, Love is for Giving; and the best way to show you are Caring, is to do a lot of Sharing".

This theme would be reflected throughout her remarkable life. During her year as Worthy Grand Matron, Rennie had Exchange Visits with New Mexico, Louisiana, and Arkansas, and these were all well-attended and enjoyed. As Sister Rennie's year concluded, there were 115,747 members in 739 Chapters throughout the state of Texas. Members still talk of her extraordinary consideration and love for the membership and of the Grand Chapter of Texas.

Sister Rennie Ofton was first introduced to General Grand Chapter by serving as a Personal Page to Mildred Haney Harris, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, in 1976. She was elected as a Right Worthy Grand Trustee of General Grand Chapter in 1994, and served two terms, culminating as Chairman in 1997-2000, a total period of six years. She was elected Right Worthy Associate Grand Conductress in 2000 at the General Grand Chapter Assembly held in Detroit, with a large number of Texans in attendance to support her candidacy. Three years later, she ascended to Right Worthy Grand Conductress in Portland, Oregon, and was elected Right Worthy Associate Grand Matron in 2006 in Minneapolis. During her years of service as Most Worthy Grand Matron, Rennie sponsored a GGC Committee focused on Service Dogs and, during her assembly, was presented a check for \$1.2 million, illustrating the amount that had been raised for Service Dogs during her years in office. Rennie held her 47th General Grand Chapter "The Nature of God's Love Around The World" Assembly in 2012 in Ft Worth, Texas, which was well-attended by members from the United States, Canada, and many other countries around the world.

Rennie was always active in her community and particularly in her church, Crestholme Presbyterian, where she served for many years. She taught Sunday School, sang in the choir, worked with the youth, was the first female deacon in the church, and was ordained as an Elder in 1968. In the Presbyterian church, being ordained as an Elder is the highest honor that can be bestowed on a lay person in the congregation.

Throughout her exceptional life, Sister Rennie was a devoted friend to a multitude of people, particularly the Eastern Star membership of Texas, and she showed her compassion and thoughtfulness in everything that she said and did. Her life was a shining light and her smile and warmth endeared her to all who knew her.

Sister Rennie, your life was an inspiration and a source of joy to not only those in Texas, but around the world, and your service to our beautiful Order will always be treasured. To those of us who were fortunate enough to share a portion of our lives with you, we are much better for the experience. You will never be forgotten.

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

Our hearts are heavy and saddened as we mourn the passing of our Brother Harles I. Creech, Past Most Worthy Grand Patron of the General Grand Chapter and Past Grand Patron of Louisiana, Order of the Eastern Star.

As everyone knows, Harles was just a "Good Ole Country Boy" his entire life and never met a stranger. Brother Harles was born September 17, 1927 and passed away February 25, 2020, residing in Oak Grove, Louisiana. He is preceded in death by his parents, Oscar and Claudie Creech. Harles was the eldest of 12 children and played the role of caretaker to all his siblings. He combed hair, wiped a runny nose, doctored a scraped knee and comforted the heart when daddy saw fit to give someone a spanking. He had to walk several miles to school – no bus service, but completed his high school education with many honors and also played basketball. At home it was plowing, picking cotton by hand and running the syrup mill.

Harles met the love of his life, Estelle Salters, and they were married on March 13, 1948. After a few years of farming, he decided to go to Texas and try the oil fields. He brought home \$190 every two weeks and that was good living! His goal was to pay for the farm and start a Salvage Yard, which was always his dream - to operate his own business with his feeling "treat everyone as you would like to be treated", which he always believed. The Creech Salvage Yard is still operating - since 1954! He was also an active sponsor of the Little League Ball Club and was President of the Cannoneers Riding Club for 25 years. Harles and Estelle had three children; Diane Creech Gunter and husband Danny, Steven Creech and wife, Peggy and Carol Creech; four grandchildren, four great grandchildren and one great-great granddaughter.

His travels through the Order of the Eastern Star began on his initiation date of October 18, 1965 at Guiding Star Chapter No. 66 in Oak Grove, which he and Estelle loved dearly. He served as Worthy Patron ten times. He was then elected and served as Worthy Grand Patron of Louisiana in 1980-1981 with Sister Pat Cleveland in the "Our Heritage in the Sand" Session. He was appointed, by Sister Helen R. Cox, as a General Grand Chapter Committee member and served the 1985-1988 Triennium on the "International Peace Garden" committee. Climbing up this prestigious ladder, Brother Harles was elected Right Worthy Associate Grand Patron from 1997-2000 and served as our Most Worthy Grand Patron of General Grand Chapter with Sister Dorothy Dewing in the "Peace Around the World" Session 2000-2003. Sister Dorothy always said Harles would be an asset to our Order because of how he cares for others! They traveled extensively over the entire world instituting new chapters in Vienna, Austria, Brazil and Mexico.

Harles looked as good in his black coat and bow tie, with his full head of white hair, as he did in a straw hat, barefoot and overalls which he wore, along with some of our other Louisiana Past Grand Patrons, in the "fun night" at the Grand Chapter Session in 2008. This PMWGP and a few of the PGP's of Louisiana actually had lots of "fun" kicking up a leg or two and bending their knees, to the best of their ability, to "Turkey in the Straw". He was certainly a great sport and would do anything asked of him! Please keep in mind, one of his most famous sayings that came straight from his heart:

"Remember – it just don't cost nutten to be kind to one another" – I Love Ya All!

Sympathy is extended to Sister Estelle, his loving wife of 72 years, his family, Sisters and Brothers of this Grand Jurisdiction, Sisters and Brothers of the General Grand Chapter and everyone around the world he came in contact with by touching their lives during his many years of traveling. They just don't come any better than that country fella, Brother Harles I. Creech, who will certainly be missed by all of us, all around the World.

"A never-ending commitment to the community because we care." This is the perfect slogan for our Relief Operation Project and absolutely describes Rebecca Parrish Chapter # 5, Olongapo City, Philippines, for this term 2020.

Faith, Hope and Unity are the essential core values and the center of our Chapter for this term 2020. A day after our 66th public Installation of Elected and Appointed Officers when a catastrophe hit the Province of Batangas and nearby areas. Taal Volcano erupted last January 12, 2020, causing heavy damage to both lives and worst, many totally lost their homes and means of living which caused them immeasurable pain, misery and suffering in life. We know what the people from Batangas and nearby areas felt. We were in their shoes 19 years ago when Mt. Pinatubo erupted. Now it was our turn and commitment with a noble cause to help them to rise again. We, Rebecca Parrish Chapter, acted fast by spearheading the donation drive campaign and purchasing those essentials and basic needs to be included on the relief package. We were able to manage and provide relief goods to nearly 300 families. As they recuperate and start a new beginning, we gave them hope as they don't know how and where to start. Regardless of the issues with logistics and the struggle of transporting the goods from where we are at to them, we trudged on. It was not easy, but we managed to get through the 250km distance between the City of Olongapo and the Province of Batangas.

Just when we thought we got through that hurdle, here came another crisis that affected not only one Province or City. This time a pandemic struck the whole world. We are now faced with an invisible enemy, the highly contagious Covid-19 virus. It is so lethal and our health is more valuable than what material compensation can offer. The economy came to a halt when our Government called for an enhanced community quarantine last March 17, 2020 up to the present with no other recourse but to stay home. We have the resources and manpower to help and so we took on the challenge of giving assistance to the families who temporarily lost their means of living, and those underprivileged. This time we had to step up so together with our Masonic Brothers and Eastern Star Sisters and Brothers, we are able to aid and extend assistance through packing and distributing relief goods to nearly a thousand families in Olongapo City daily.

We, of course, are in fear of the unknown, but we stand with the other frontliners in making sure that no

one dies due to hunger. Our selfless and courageous efforts as Covid-19 Task Force volunteers unmeasurable. With our noble cause, we are able to prove again that no barriers, walls and differences can set aside our sincerity and our compassion as Masonic and Eastern Star members from one another because we consider the community as our extended family "We because Care as One."

On May 20, 2020, Brother Larry McVey, WGP, and his Forever Proud Club Members presented a check for \$5,000 to Fisher House Manager Larry Vetter on behalf of the Grand Chapter of Mississippi. Groups and Chapters across the State raised funds for the Special Project throughout the year by selling pins, donations, etc. The attending members included Brother Larry McVey, WGP, along with Sisters Lynette McVey, Grand Esther; Pat Anderson, DDGM 11th District; DeLois Langston, WM; Jo Ann Tarrant, PM; and Sandy Henderson, PM. After the presentation, the group was treated to tour of the lovely facility. Previously, Long Beach Chapter #51 had donated \$1,000 to Fisher House in honor of Brother Larry McVey, WGP.

The Zachary and Elizabeth Fisher House at Keesler Air Force Base (AFB), Biloxi, provides a comfortable home-away-from-home for families of seriously ill patients at the Keesler Medical Center and the Biloxi/Gulfport Veterans Health Administration Hospitals. The criteria for occupancy are that the guest be either a member of the "support team" of the patient hospitalized at these facilities or a patient in an outpatient status. Built in 1992 at no cost to the Government, the 5,000 square foot, two-story Keesler Fisher House is the sixth of 59 Fisher Houses donated to those in need of lodging by the late Zachary and Elizabeth Fisher of New York. The intent was, and still is, to provide home-like accommodations. Operating costs are underwritten by nominal guest fees and by contributions to the non-profit Fisher House of Keesler, Inc., a MS 501(C)3 tax-exempt corporation. Their hope is that with enough donations, they can reduce or eliminate guest fees altogether in the future.

The Fisher House is a compassionate-care facility, located on Keesler AFB within walking distance of the hospital. The House provides a comfortable place to stay, serving patients and families from all branches of the Military and Veterans receiving active treatment at the Keesler Hospital and the Biloxi Veterans Administration Medical Campus. The House provides a safe and comfortable home-away-from-home for families in need. Guests must live outside a 50-mile radius of the hospital. Availability of rooms is provided on a space- available basis.





DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING A YO-YO SWAG

Yo-Yo Swag Blooms Big In Rooms!

A COUNTRY SPIN'S put on spring decorby this pleasing posy accent from Par Ford of Arlington, Texas.

The idea originally sprouted from the yo-yos Patenjoys making. "It's a favorite thing to do." she describes of assembling the gathered fabric circles.

"This time, I attached yo yos to ratfia I braided into a sway. It looks realty pretty arching over a door or perking up a batchen window."

Materials Needed:

Tracing paper and pencil Compass

44-inch-wide 100% cotton or cotton-blavit lebrics 1.14 yerd each ar sersus of light green pin-dot for yo-yo leaves, dusty mose print aind dusty rose and cream check for yo-yo potals and light blue and white print for yo-yo flower centers.

Matching all purcose thread Hary-sewing accole Lightweight cardboard

Natural reffie—40 to 50 strands, each about 30 inches long Markers—green, rose and bue to match

Intries
VAlide buttons—two 3/4 inch and

three 1/2 inch Two 18-inch lengths of 18-gauge

crall wire Pinking shows (optional)

Salssors Glue you and glue slick

Finished Size: Yo-yo flower swag measures about 9-1/2 inches tall x 20 inches long.

Directions:

MAKING YO-YOS: Use the compass to draw a 3-in, circle and a 5-in, circle and a 5-in, circle calo facing paper and fifteen 1-1/2-in, circles crub lightweight cardiboard. Cull out circles.

Out 3-in, circles from the following fathes: Six green pin-dot and three each of blue and white print, dusty rose print, and dusty rose and cream check. Also out two 5-in, tabric circles from dusty rose print.

braid about 18 in, long. The end of braid with thread to secure. Trim ends of reffig braid to desired length.

With pinking shears or straight scissors, cut two 1-1/2-in, x 18-in, strips from dusty rose and cresm classk. The each in a bow. Clue a bow over thread at each end of attlia braid.

Glue large yo-yo flower to center of reffic heald and the smaller yo-yo flowers to each side of carrier flower as shown in photo.

Glue 3/4-in, buttons to centers of bows and 1/2-in, buttons to centers of blue yo-yos.

Thread the 13 in.-long craft wires through threid on back. Make a small loop at center back of one whe for hanger. Bend braid into a gentle curve to shape swag as shown in photo.

Thread hand-sewing noodle with two strands of matching thread and knot ends together. Item under an 1/8-in, hern as you servia running stiffen around one 3-in, fabric circle as snown in Fig. 1, lasving long thread ends.

Use markers to color the center of one side of each cardboard direle, coloring six circles green, three blue and six

Center a matching carriboard circle colored side up on the wrong side of stitched letric circle. Pull threads gently to draw up fabric around cardhoard and tasten off. Distribute gathers evenly around cardboard circle with your fingers and center opening as shown in Fig. 2. Receat, making a total of 15 small yo-yes with cardboard centers.

Make two large dusty rose print yoyos without cardboard centers.

ASSEMBLY: Heferring to the photo above, glue three small dusty rose print yo yos and three dusty rose check your in a circle with edges overlapping. Glue a blue and white print yo yo to the center of the circle. Glue a green pin-dot yo-yo to the back on each side for leaves.

Glue a blue and white print ye-yo to the center of a large dusty rose print ye-yo. Glue a green pin-dot ye-yo to each side of dusty rose print ye-yo. Bepeat, using remaining ye-yos.

Stack strands of raffio together. File any color filmed around raffia about 5 in. trom one end to secure. Divide raffia into three equal bundles and make a flat

As with the rest of the world in early March 2020, our local rural hospital, Moab Regional Hospital, in Moab, Utah, put out a call for volunteers to make masks and gowns. We started out slowly with supplies we had on hand, sheets donated by local hotels and a local quilt store, Canyonlands Quilts, providing a gown pattern and elastic to get us started. We developed a pleated mask pattern from a paper one from the hospital. We made a few gowns and several face masks for the hospital but that was the tip of the iceberg.

Sister Paula Poglejan, WGM, asked me if we would make masks for any of our members who wanted one. A message was posted on the Utah OES Facebook page and several members were grateful for the opportunity to receive one. We made and mailed them to members throughout the State.

But still, it was only starting. Next, our brother and sister-in-law, Kerry and Lorrie Lange, who own a small business in Moab, asked if we would make some masks for them to give away. Little did we know what we were getting into.

Sister Keven put out a request on the local Facebook page asking for donations from fabric stashes so we could continue to make masks and we received several generous donations. We made a hundred or more masks and gave them to Desert West Office Supply, my brother's company, and they put them out on a table for people to take. Some would not take them unless they could pay for them, so a donation jar was put out. The result: to date, July 11, 2020, we have made more than 1,300 masks, most of which went to the store. With the donations we have received, we have been able to purchase elastic, thread and more fabric to keep our little sewing project up and running.

In addition to the 1,300 masks, I personally made 100 adult and 100 kids masks and donated them to the Navajo Nation.

We are both retired and not only happy to have something to keep us busy during this trying time but to have a way to contribute to our Sisters and Brothers wellbeing.

We wish you all good health and will be happy when we can once again meet with members, socialize and perhaps not need facemasks!
