Florida Grand Chapter Presents Check to Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine

After a restful night and a sumptuous breakfast at the nearby

Historic Brookstown Inn, a Florida delegation of over forty Order of the Eastern Star (OES) members drove to Wake forest institute for regenerative Medicine (WFIRM. Among those attending were three special OES guests, the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Glenda Winchester; Peg Reiterman, Chairman of Regenerative



Medicine Committee, GGC & PGM of Ohio; and PGM Nancy L. Ford, Editor of the Eastern Star Journal.



The delegation gathered in a conference room where they met with Ms. Genevra Kelly, Chief Philanthropy Program Officer. She outlined the day's activities which included lunch, a tour of the Institute, and a special meeting with Dr. Anthony Atala, Chair and Institute Director on September 21.

Ms. Kelly, a fellow OES sister, presented

a short lecture on how WFIRM began, its mission and how the OES became involved. Open since 2004, WFIRM is a non-profit organization that depends upon government grants and private philanthropies, such as OES, for funding support. WFIRM's mission is to create a medical center to provide patients with affordable treatments and therapies with the goal of curing the disease rather just treating it. She explained how Wake Forest wants to be the trusted voice people can turn to when looking for treatment or therapy.

She explained Wake Forest Institute is a non-profit organization which does not accept money from big companies because of the strings that come attached to that money. She said medical treatments should be available to all people, not just those with money.

Although governmental grants provide 80% of its funding, it is often earmarked for specific military projects such as finding new ways to regenerate repairs to horrific injuries to make soldiers as whole as possible. It was this mission of helping wounded soldiers that drew the MWGM Helen Westmoreland to WFIRM and created the OES connection. WFIRM researchers have successfully engineered replacement tissues and organs. Their medical focus is multi-pronged: programs are not limited to repairing injuries, but include research into treatments and therapies for Alzheimer's, diabetes, posttraumatic stress disorder, cancer, drug addiction, aging, and cardiovascular diseases to name just a few. The tour followed a delicious Greek lunch buffet that left no one hungry. The OES delegation was divided into small groups and assigned a tour guide comprised of both staff and advanced students who were informative and delightful. Each group started on different floors or intervals to avoid any crossover. The groups were advised photographs were offlimits while touring.

It was a lot to take in. Everything from organ engineering to the 3D bioprinter developed in 2016 using "cell ink." One of the most fascinating things seen on the tour was the "Body on a Chip" Project. This project grows miniature 3D organs like hearts, lungs, and livers called organoids and they can be used singly or linked together to test new drugs. These tests on the organoids can help make more accurate predictions of the human body's response to new medications, speeding up getting results in weeks instead of months or years.

After the tour, the OES delegation returned to the conference room to hear from Dr. Anthony Atala. This personable, humble man spoke about his research and his passion for regenerative medicine. He talked about how the loss of one young patient sent him on his remarkable medical journey, his first success with implanting a patient with a regenerated organ, and how Wake Forest convinced him this was the best place to achieve his goals. He said that regenerative medicine is the future of medicine because quality of life is important to everyone.

Dr. Atala talked about the importance of funding at all stages of research which is a 24/7 process. Data is the key to finding funding. With data, more research can be done. He described the testing research stage as the "Valley of Death" because people want to see data, not ideas. This makes funding difficult to find at this



stage. Without testing to create the data, a project can languish for months or years. This is why philanthropy is crucial for this stage of research.

After a Q&A with Dr. Atala, the MWGM Glenda Winchester, spoke on the support OES was with the regenerative program, how Wake Forest Institute aligns with OES's ideals, and without funding, there can be no research. And without research, there would be no medical cures.

Florida Grand Chapter members Margaret Nathurst, GGCCM, PGM, and Grand Treasurer; Billy Williams, Co-Chairman of the Regenerative Medicine Committee GGC and PGP; William "Bill" Kranz, WGP; AGM Gail Jerrell, AGM; Brenda Keepin, GS; Debbie Rosenthal, GC, and Sandy Leduc, AGC presented an \$87,000 check from Florida OES Grand Chapter to a very surprised and appreciative Dr. Atala. This was OES stepping in and filling the gap.

While photographs are off-limit, I did receive permission to include those below. Here's some more information on the research being conducted at WFIRM (also see following page from WFIRM):

Neo-Natal on the condition that causes the intestines to rot;

Kids with Autism-70% have intestinal issues (i.e., IBS, Crohn's disease);

Lung on a chip to benefit those with cystic fibrosis and other lung issues, especially little babies;

PATMOS - a grant from DOD to allow researchers to identify a virus and find a solution which will not only benefit our Armed Forces but all mankind:

Burns/skin/wound healing - developing wound care that military can carry with them on the battlefield, in addition to working on solutions for wounds that won't heal:

Bladders/Pelvic Girdles - grow several body parts that have been damaged in an IED explosion

The keynote is that "ALL" the above, plus all the other research projects that are currently going on at WFIRM (i.e., skin cell replacement, knee joint replacements, macular degeneration and the study on ear "hair" cells to prevent hearing loss), not only benefit our babies and soldiers, but "ALL" of us. This world of research, using the bodies "OWN stem cells, is absolutely a gift from God to man.

WFIRM ACHIEVEMENTS

Achievements of Institute scientists include engineering replacement tissues and organs in all four categories: flat structures, tubular tissues, hollow organs and solid organs.

- First to demonstrate that complex, layered tissue structures can be engineered using cells. (1994)
- Developed the first tissue-engineered product to go to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for Phase 1 approval for clinical applications, consisting of cells and biomaterials for injectable therapy. (1995)
- First to use biomaterials alone, without addition of cells, implanted in patients for the regeneration of organs. (1996)
- First to create a laboratory-grown organ engineered bladder tissue (hollow organ) that was successfully implanted in patients. (1999 first implantation; publication 2006)
- First to create a functional experimental solid organ, a miniature kidney that secretes urine. (2003)
- Led the team that engineered tubular organs (urine conduits) and implanted them in patients. (2004 first implantation; publication 2011)
- Founded the Regenerative Medicine Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to the advancement of regenerative medicine treatments and therapies. (2005)
- Proved feasibility of printing living tissue structures to replace injured or diseased tissue in patients. (2006)
- Identified and characterized a new source of stem cells derived from amniotic fluid and placenta, which show promise for the treatment of many diseases. (2007)
- Selected to co-lead the Armed Forces Institute of Regenerative Medicine, an \$85 million, federally funded effort to apply regenerative medicine to battlefield injuries. (2008)
- Started the first initiative for regenerative medicine manufacturing, through the establishment of a joint industrial engineering program (2008) and the Regenerative medicine Manufacturing Society. (2014)
- First to engineer functional experimental solid organs (penile tissue and livers) using a strategy to recycle donor organs, with potential applications to other solid organs, such as the kidney and pancreas. (2004 and 2010)
- Led the team that implanted engineered vaginas into four girls with a rare genetic defect. (2005 first implantation; publication 2014)
- Selected to lead the 2nd phase of the Armed Forces Institute of Regenerative Medicine, a \$75-million project. (2013)
- Developed a 3D bioprinter (the Integrated Tissue and Organ Printing System) over a 14-year period specifically designed to print living tissue structures. (publication 2016)
- Developed a highly functional body-on-a-chip platform that integrates multiple normal human cell derived tissues with a common "blood" supply system for drug toxicity testing and personalized medicine. (2017)
- Developed miniature 3D human brains (organoids), the first engineered tissue equivalent to naturally resemble the normal human blood brain barrier, containing all six major cell types found in organs. (publication 2018)
- Developed an engineered uterus that can sustain pregnancy and live delivery pre-clinically. (publication 2020)
- WFIRM team won 1st and 2nd place in the NASA Vascular Tissue Challenge, creating vascularized liver tissues with two different 3D bioprinting methods. (2021)

Hello, my name is Sister Sara Quinby. Some of you know me as 'Happy Glass'. I am a PGM of Delaware (DE) and for this Triennium, I am serving as Chairman of GGC's Public Relations Committee.

When Sister Glenda Winchester, MWGM, first asked me to chair this Committee, I thought it would be interesting and at the same time challenging. I have been an active member of Eastern Star for almost 60 years. I love Star and I love to talk, a good combination! My favorite topic is the Order of the Eastern Star. I enjoy telling people I meet about the "good work" Star does in our community and the "fun times" we have at our activities. We work together and play together, all for the good of the Order.

Public Relations is a way of building and maintaining a positive image with the public. This can be accomplished in a variety of ways. When relating to a friends (non-members), we can tell them what a great time we had at the neighborhood yard sale we held last week. How much fun we had collecting and selling all the 'goodies' our members gave. How much money we raised and what we did with it. For example, "Our Chapter had a rummage sale last week. Our members donated wonderful items for us to sell. We had a great time and raised money that we're donating to the 'Service Dog Committee."

We should always try to remember to be positive when speaking in the presence of non-members. Negative remarks can easily turn off non-members and potential candidates.

Public Relations people are storytellers. They try to build a mutual and beneficial relationship between the public and the organization they represent. You and I are the "BEST' public relations people the Order has to offer.

In dealing with the public, we should try to create a story, "Let your good work shine!" A good story is the most common form of public relations. When speaking to a non-member, perhaps tell them about the new officers that were recently installed in your Chapter. What excellent memory work the Installing Officer did. What the decorations in the room looked like. What the new WM is planning for her year. Future activities of the Chapter that you think they would enjoy attending.

Talk or relate an activity your Chapter is having. For example, this year the GC of Delaware will be selling honey to benefit our Service Dog Committee. Last year, we were able to donate \$10,000 to a small child suffering from epilepsy to help towards the cost of a Service Dog that will alert her family when she is about to have a seizure. If your GC has an ESTARL or scholarship program, talk about it.

Is your Chapter or GC doing community service? Do you visit firehouses and/or police stations? Why not make a small basket of treats and take it to local firehouses, first responders, emergency room workers; any public service group. Always include a note saying how much we appreciate the good service they give to our community. You may not realize it, but these little acts of kindness are all good publicity for our Order.

There are various tools that are available to us that do not involve spending a lot of money. Does your community have a parade on July 4th? Why not get together some of the members from your Chapter to ride on a small float. Be sure to make a sign for the float. Again, let your light shine.

Do you volunteer at the local hospitals? My husband and I work as escorts at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Elsmere, DE. We take the patients who require wheelchairs to their appointments. We wear OES emblems on our volunteer vests. We use a hobby cart to distribute clothing, toiletries, hobbies, etc., to the Veterans who live in the Community Living Center at the hospital. We have a big OES emblem on the front of our cart. We always tell the residents, "These gifts are from the members of the Order of the Eastern Star." Again, "Let your light shine."

Additional tools are giving press releases to various newspapers and radio stations in your area and planning social events that are designed for public outreach.

There is an old saying among Public Relations people, "Advertising is what you pay for public relations is what you pray for."

Make use of social media. Post positive pictures and remarks. Put pictures taken at events on Facebook, Twitter, etc. Try to make people wish they had been there. Make them want to be part of the fun. Keep your remarks interesting. Talk or write about the fun we share when we're together working for the good of our Order!

Above all else, always remember **YOU** are the best **public relations representative** the Order has.

INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF THE RAINBOW FOR GIRLS

The International Order of the Rainbow for Girls is celebrating their 100th anniversary this year. Rainbow was founded in 1922 by the Rev. W. Mark Sexson, a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma (OK) and a PGP. The International Order of the Rainbow for Girls is a 501c3 charitable organization. Through leadership training, challenging study and public service projects, the girls learn important life lessons. In addition to countless hours of community service, members raise hundreds of thousands of dollars each year for charities.

This past month, the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls held their 49th Biennial Session in Oklahoma City. One of the highlights of the session was the tour to the Supreme Temple in McAlester. The Supreme Temple was built in 1951 in the heart of McAlester. Designed by our founders as a working headquarters of functional offices, supply and shipping departments, it also includes artifacts from Rainbow Girls all over the world, a library, trophy room, several sponsored rooms displaying artifacts from different areas, as well as a large meeting room and stage which encompasses much of the third floor. Building materials from throughout the world were used in its construction. The Supreme Temple is architecturally significant as an excellent example of a mid-twentieth century Moderne Style building. A comprehensive assessment of the Supreme Temple was done in 2012. It was found to be in very good repair for its age with the exception of the HVAC system which was original to the building. Plans began to establish a Century Campaign to address the needs of the building. In 2013, the Supreme Temple was added to the National Register of Historic Places.


The Century Campaign was started in 2016 and divided into three Phases. Phase I was the replacement of the original HVAC System which was completed in 2018. Phase II is the re-glazing and sealing of windows and complete tuck pointing of the entire exterior of the building. Due to the pandemic, fundraising efforts have slowed considerably and raising the necessary funds to complete this phase has been difficult. Phase III will be the establishment of an endowment fund to maintain the building. The Supreme Temple was paid for on the day it opened largely with funds raised by the Rainbow Girls. The establishment of the endowment fund will ensure the necessary funds to preserve the Supreme Temple for future generations.

At the recent opening session of the Supreme Assembly on August 1, 2022 in Oklahoma City, the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of OK, Mr. Scott Vincent, was joined by Mr. John L. Logan, Executive Director of the Masonic Charity Foundation of OK at the podium where they presented our Supreme Worthy Advisor, Mrs. Judy Fortenberry, with a check for \$100,000 representing a grant from the Masonic Charity Foundation of OK on behalf of the Masonic Fraternity of OK. These funds are intended to support the Century Campaign Phase II. In addition to this donation, the Masons of OK have challenged all supporters of Rainbow to support the restoration of the Supreme Assembly International Headquarters Century Campaign Phase II. To that end, they have issued this challenge: The Masons of Oklahoma will match dollar for dollar up to \$100,000 all donations made from August 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022. The International Order of the Rainbow for Girls is most grateful for the Masonic Charities Foundation of Oklahoma and all organizations and individuals who are assisting us with our Century Campaign.

A MASONIC PILGRIMAGE TRIP

Members from Iowa (IA) and Nebraska completed a motorcoach tour to Philadelphia and Washington, DC, billed as a Masonic Pilgrimage. The trip was organized by Brother John Hauser, GGCCM International Headquarters Committee and PGP of Iowa, to visit the Perry Belmont House, the International Headquarters of the Order of the Eastern Star.

The first destination was the Masonic Temple in Philadelphia. It was built in 1873 and is on the National Register of Historic Landmarks. A guide escorted us through the Temple and showed us its ornate-themed Lodge rooms, Exhibit Hall and the Museum, which contains Washington's apron and many other historical treasures.

Next, we traveled to Arlington, Virginia, to the George Washington National Masonic Memorial. We were given a tour of the Memorial Hall, the George Washington Museum, the Golden Age of Masonic Architecture exhibit, the theater, the Grand Masonic Hall, the Family of Freemasonry exhibit and the observation deck with views of Alexandria and Washington. The Family of Freemasonry exhibit has displays featuring Masonic organizations, including our Order. We were delighted to see the Grand Lodge of Iowa IA was the current Grand Lodge of the Month.

The morning after spending the night in Arlington, we headed into Washington to tour the International Headquarters at the Belmont House. We met at the grand staircase when we entered the foyer through the glass and iron front doors. Brothers Charles Chandler, RWGSecretary; Lawrence von Weigel, International Headquarters Administrator; and Paul Dolinsky, Historical Advisor, divided those in attendance into two groups to tour the building. We saw many beautiful things. They included the Eastern Star rug, a mural of the five Heroines of the Order, a hand-embroidered folding screen depicting a Royal Hunting Scene, a gold-leafed Steinway Grand Piano and 19thcentury oil paintings. We learned there is a project to refurbish the State Dining Room chairs with new caning and fabric that will cost \$600 per chair.

During the tour, we collected 25 cents each time someone used the "B" word (bus) to refer to the motorcoach. We presented \$300.03 to Brother Larry and RWGSecretary Emeritus Sister Betty Briggs issued a challenge to double the amount donated that could be used to refinish one of the chairs in the State Dining Room. By the end of the trip, the total amount collected was \$614.93.

Following the tour of the International Headquarters, we were hosted to lunch prepared by the Washington DC Temple Board and Star Chapters members at their meeting place on C Street. We saw their meeting room with the murals of the Heroines of our Order. It was great to fellowship with our Sisters and Brothers.

After lunch, we visited the National Mall and some of the Smithsonian Institute's facilities. In the evening, we saw several memorials, including the Lincoln Memorial, the World War II Veterans Memorial, the Korean War Veterans Memorial and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial War.

The next day we headed for home. The trip highlighted the steps taken to preserve the International Headquarters and heard about what is planned. The building is in good



hands, but we all must contribute to help maintain and protect this priceless treasure.


In 2019, Minnesota (MN) established a Service Dog Committee and Grand Line Officers decided to support Helping Paws, based in Hopkins, as they provide Service Dogs for Veterans with PTSD. MN Grand Chapter has given a significant amount of money to Helping Paws, and a number of members felt OES was not getting sufficient recognition. A meeting took place with Helping Paws new executive director in April 2022, and she suggested a number of things to improve OES visibility. OES used \$5,000 of the money raised for the project in 2021-2022 to become a top sponsor for Helping Paws Tail Waggin' Dinner, their largest fundraising event, held on September 10, 2022. Eastern Star was given two tables at the dinner as part of the sponsorship, and 20 MN members paid \$50 each to attend that dinner (so the entire \$5,000 went to Helping Paws). MN members also contributed gift cards for gift baskets donated to a silent auction held at the dinner. Those baskets raised a total of \$1,250 for Helping Paws. MARYLAND'S 125TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

On September 11, 2022, the Grand Chapter of Maryland (MD) celebrated 125 years of Eastern Star history at the Boumi Shrine, in Baltimore. Over 300 members and friends joined in our long-anticipated celebration. Sister Carol A. Newman, WGM, and Brother Richard P. Naegele, WGP, were honored to welcome Sister Glenda G. Winchester, MWGM, and Brother F. Lon Lowery, MWGP, and his wife, Sister Barbara; Brother Charles Chandler, RWGSecretary, and his wife Sister Judy, PGM of West Virginia; Sister Debbie Dhayer, RWGC; Sister Bonnie Youngblood, WGEsther; and Brother Marlin L. Mills, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, AF&AM, and his Lady, Sister Brenda; and many distinguished guests from the surrounding the Jurisdictions of the District of Columbia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia, and others as from far away as New Hampshire.

When we began our journey in July of 2020, we were in the midst of a pandemic and unsure if we would be able to celebrate this milestone at all but we donned our face masks and began our tasks, and two years later our mission was completed.

From our earliest records of 9 Chapters and 633 members in 1898, we reached our pinnacle in the late 1960's with 108 Chapters and a membership of over 26,000 members. As with all Grand Jurisdictions, our Chapters have declined to 34 and our membership is just under 3,000 as of this celebration.

Entering the beautiful Boumi Shrine, we are always thrilled by its grandeur. To the far right stood the five Heroines of our Order as painted by our own Sister Shirley Bean to stand front and center in the East for our 100th Anniversary Session in April of 1998 in Hagerstown. Sister Shirley hung them in her home until her death and her son, Brett, has made a gift of them to our WGM.

In the other corner stood a banner of our MD Flag with our Eastern Star as its center, furled as though blowing in the breeze (which was used throughout the celebration on our pins, Anniversary Booklet cover, invitations, tickets and program booklets, favors and special glasses for our toast) for the picture taking pleasure of our members and guests.

In the center of the entry way and to the rear stood shadow boxes containing the pins sold for the Special Projects of our WGMs and PGPs from 1967-68 to the present, and a shadow box displaying Sister Nina Fey's PGM jewel and a delegate badge from the GGC's 14th Triennial Session in Chicago, Illinois, held on September23-25, 1913. To the far left were a display of some of the many symbolic and colorful quilts of our WGMs and WGPs, made for them and presented each year at our Annual Session. The PGMs and PGPs in attendance wore their travel gown and vests for their year.

Thousands of twinkling lights surrounded the head table and MD's colors of red, black and gold were everywhere and included in the beautiful floral centerpieces. The Grand Officers were attired in their red travel gowns and sparkling gold vests.

Our entertainment was the Maryland State Boys Choir founded in 1987. They have been designated as Maryland's "Goodwill Ambassadors," performing in over 40 states and 15 international countries.

The Grand Chapter was honored to receive a Declaration from the Governor's Office recognizing our 125 years of serving the people of MD. This Declaration will hang in the Grand Chapter Office along with the shadow boxes. Our Grand Master couldn't have said it better when he mentioned that it was a pleasure to be in the largest group of our Masonic family in three years in Maryland, a sure sign that the worst of this pandemic is passing and we can meet once again as Sisters and Brothers, with hope for our future and high regard for each other. To quote our WGM, "God indeed had this celebration planned for our Grand Chapter." Here's to another 125 years of the rays of our beautiful Star shining brightly leading us into the future.

In September 2022, the monies raised during the 2021-2022 Grand Chapter year were mailed or delivered to several deserving organizations in Maryland (MD) and Northern Virginia (VA). On Thursday, September 15, 2022, Brother Glen Sunderland, Jr. PGP; Sisters Fran Sunderland, PM; and Shawn Garren, Jr. PGM, had the pleasure to deliver checks to the following organizations:

INOVA Schar Cancer Institute: The first stop was in Fairfax, VA, to the INOVA Schar Cancer Institute to meet with Ms. Amy Richards. Ms. Richards is the Executive Director of Philanthropy. This campus used to be the former Headquarters of Mobil Exxon. INOVA has done a fantastic job converting this complex into one that will help many cancer patients in the Washington DC Metropolitan area. The Jr. PGM chose this Cancer Center because it is one of the leading Cancer Research Centers in the US. More importantly, it is where her father, Brother Patrick A. Curtis, PGP of MD, received treatment after he was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in 2020. Sadly, he passed away in February of 2021, several months before Sister Shawn was installed as WGM. Sister Shawn wanted to give back to this beautiful facility for taking care of her Dad and Mom during this difficult time. The GC donated \$2,617.00. These funds will go to the patients of the Cancer Center to help them during their treatment.

Fidos for Freedom: The second stop was Fidos for Freedom in Laurel, MD. Thankfully the traffic around the Capital Beltway in Montgomery County was light, and it only took them 40 minutes to get from Northern VA to Laurel. (That trip can take up to 2 hours during rush-hour traffic). They had a noon appointment with Anita Cisneros, Office Manager, and Dawn Nakioshis, Bookkeeper. They also had the pleasure of meeting one of the Service Dogs FIDOS trained along with their owner. This 501c3 organization's vision is to increase the quality of life and provide companionship to the residents of our local community through specially trained Service Dogs, hearing dogs, and therapy dogs.

Sister Shawn explained that since MD GC last worked with FIDOS during Sister Bette Bowen and Brother William Gunn's 2013-2014 term. In 2018, it was voted to make Service Dogs GGC's philanthropic charity. She also told them that the GC now has a dedicated Service Dogs Committee, and we will be supporting these organizations annually.


FIDOS just received six new puppies to train, and our funds will help go a long way in the upkeep of these unique dogs. We presented a check to them for \$26,053.58, and they were amazed and grateful for our generous donation.

was Towson University (TU) to meet with Mr. Dario DiBattista, Director; Toby Frevert, Veteran Support Specialist; and Frances Washburn, Military and Veterans Center. Sister Shawn attended Towson when it was known as Towson State University (Class of 1986). During her years at Towson, the student body mainly lived off campus and commuted to classes. Since then, TU has exploded, and more students live on campus. You are probably wondering why they went to the TU campus. Sisters and Brothers, many colleges and universities have Military and Veterans Centers that reach out and help our Veterans and Active Duty Service members attending classes at these schools. The Center is made up of former military personnel or military dependents who help these students with anything you can think of. Some students ask for help with purchasing textbooks, some might need a little extra help with food money, and last year at TU, one student came to the Center to ask for help because they lost two family members to COVID. These are some of the ways our donations will help this small group of military families. A group like this helped Sister Shawn when she attended the University of Pittsburgh in 2012-14. She firmly believed that MD Star should pay it forward to the TU Veterans. A check for \$3,981 was presented.

The ceremony below was written for the 2022 Angels Gather Here Grand Chapter of Maine Session held in Augusta, Maine on May 17, 2022.

Emblem Placing Ceremony Participants: Narrators: Sister Corley Anne Byras, GGCCM, PGM; and Brother Dale E. Hanington, PGP; Chaplain, Brother Bernard W. Gaines, PP; Marshal, Brother Roger A. White, WP; Organist, Sister Debra L. Greim, DDGM #4; Adah, Sister Rebecca G. H. Thompson, DDGM #11; Ruth, Sister Marjorie E. Pfeiffer, GGCCM Registration Committee, PGM; Esther, Sister Jean E. Hanington, PM; Martha, Sister Martha P. Ellis, DDGM #6; Electa, Sister Linda E. Gray, PM; and Soloist, Ruth P. Holden, PM.

When we enter our Chapter rooms, we immediately see our Altar, occupying a place of prominence in the center of the room. To an Eastern Star member, the Altar is symbolic of the heart of our Order. It is with reverence and gratitude that our WGM's Bible is placed on our sacred Altar. This Bible has traveled with her this year and rested upon the Altar of each Subordinate Chapter. Many special signatures have been added to its pages. It is God's precious gift to mankind and is the very foundation on which our Order of the Eastern Star was established. On its sacred pages are written the lessons of the heroines whose virtues we seek to emulate. As this Holy Book rests upon our Altar, may it stand sentinel over all our acts and may it cause us to meditate upon the teachings of our Order and reaffirm our faith in God and to remember to "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." The women of the Bible who form the Central Star of our Order are endowed with beauty, character, and spirit and teach us valuable lessons to follow in our daily lives.

From the Book of Judges, Chapter Eleven we read: "And it came to pass at the end of two months that she returned unto her father, who did with her according to his vows which he had vowed. When Adah went to the hills with her friends, the angels went there too, to hover over them. The angels also returned from the mountains to be with Adah when she willingly sacrificed her life to save her father's honor. The first point of our Central Star represents Adah, the ideal daughter. Her sense of duty and devotion to her father so guided her actions that, by her deeds, she exemplified the highest type of obedience and love. The clear blue color of Adah's veil reminds us of her fidelity and dependability. The sword reminds us that the cause of right and integrity must always be defended. The emblem of the sword and veil is lovingly placed at her station as we recall Sister Adah's story.

From the Book of Ruth, Chapter One, we read: And Ruth said, "Entreat me not to leave thee, or to return from following after thee: for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest I will lodge: thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God." The angels walked with Ruth and Naomi as they walked the many miles to Naomi's home. Under the starlit skies, the angels guided and encouraged Ruth and Naomi every step of the way. They had plenty of courage, faith, strength, wisdom and most of all loyalty to each other. A gleaner is one who is required to do hard physical labor for the smallest of rewards. Ruth's loyalty and dedication to another's welfare are taught in the lesson of the gleaner. The sheaf, however, signified abundance and the bounteous harvest which awaits us when we complete our service in the fields of the Lord. The sheaf of wheat is the emblem of our heroine Ruth and is being lovingly placed at her station as we recall Sister Ruth's touching story of constant love and devotion.

From the Book of Esther, Chapter Five, we read: "And it was so, when the King saw Esther, the Queen, standing in the court, that she obtained favor in his sight, and the King held to Esther the golden scepter that was in his hand. So Esther drew near, and touched the top of the scepter. Then said the King unto her, what wilt thou, Queen Esther, and what is thy request? It shall be even given thee to the half of the kingdom." Certainly the angels surrounded Esther as she prepared to go to the King. The angels knelt with her before the King and you could hear them singing as he reached out with his scepter. The King's golden scepter, coupled with Esther's crown, are emblems of royalty and power and are being lovingly placed at her station as we recall Sister Esther's story of heroic purpose.

From the Book of John, Chapter Eleven, we read: "Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die. Believest thou this?" Martha represents the ideal sister who assumed the responsibility and care of her brother, Lazarus, and her sister, Mary. The angels grieved with Martha as she mourned the loss of her only brother, Lazarus. The angels were with her when she went out to meet Jesus as he returned to Bethany. This broken column, the emblem of Martha, is the station of faith. In the building of a Chapter, faith forms a solid foundation. We must have faith in our leaders, faith in each other and faith in God's power and love. The broken column, an emblem of the uncertainty of human life, is placed reverently as faith and hope shines down through the centuries. May we keep the story of Martha in our hearts.

It is said if you love something, you should place it within a circle instead of a heart—for a heart can be broken but a circle goes on forever.



Edith Cavell Chapter #25 in Calgary, Alberta made a \$3,000.00 donation once again to "**Variety – the** Children's Charity of Alberta" which supports children living with disabilities. At Variety, they believe that every child has the right to be active, be social, and to belong!

Go Baby Go (GBG) is a **Toddler** Mobility Program, has been in existence since 2019 and to date they have gifted 120 cars with another 25 ready to go this summer. The program gives young children who are living with various types of disabilities the chance to maneuver their environment in a fun, independent, non-stigmatizing way.

Using off the shelf battery operated ride on toy cars that have been modified with push-button switches, supportive seating, 3D printing adaptations and communication devices for children with various types of disabilities, GBG provides opportunities for children who have very limited control over their bodies (i.e., hands, legs and feet) the ability to move independently in ways that they otherwise would not be able to do on their own.

As all of the children who receive GBG cars have mobility challenges with modifications including taking the foot pedal functionality out and switching the power to another source such as to a big button that they install on the steering wheel. Supportive seating is added to the cars for all of the children for both comfort, as well as safety as many children lack torso control and require specialized seating to hold them up. Most of the vehicles are remote control operated allowing parents and caregivers to override what the child is doing or offer up a bit of help if needed with steering.





At the car gifting on June 23,2022, 2 members of our Chapter we were able to meet Lusana, a 6-year old girl from southern Alberta, who was thrilled to get a Jeep sponsored by our Chapter, along with her parents Michael & Nichole and 2-year old brother Derald. Lusana and Derald both have 'Cockayne Syndrome',

a rare genetic disorder characterized by short stature, a small head and neurologic challenges.

Her parents were thrilled for their children to have been chosen by the program to receive a Jeep and it didn't take Lusana and Derald long to take their new wheels for a spin! The smiles of their faces made our donation worthwhile!
